The Heathland School were delighted to host the First Crane Valley Forum in November; a project to hear young people's experiences and visions for the waterways and green spaces in the Crane catchment.

The school is part of an initiative with the Crane Valley Partnership, Let's Go Outside and Learn, Habitats and Heritage, and the New Citizenship Project, with support from Thames Water and its Smarter Water Catchment programme.

The forum was attended by students from The Heathland School and Cranford Community College, The Mayor of Hounslow, MP Seema Malhotra and multiple stakeholders.

They all said "Students from The Heathland School are warm, welcoming and passionate about environmental issues and are looking forward to the next steps".

Key issues which all participants brought up included deposit return schemes, mandatory recycling, more anti-littering campaigns, improved waterways to enable wildlife to thrive, more park patrols, better enforcement and even a voice activated CCTV to deter perpetrators.

Their voices were heard loud and clear as the audience took notes and nodded their heads in approval of their suggestions. Our students have set the bar very high indeed for future Crane Valley School Forums as we welcome the next steps.

Our World of Work day with Hounslow Council at their offices in Hounslow House was incredible!

In the morning session the pupils had an introduction to the day and took part in a quiz, giving them information about the Council and their work in the Borough. The pupils then had the opportunity to have a tour of the building, accessing both the areas that are open to the public and the private space for the employees. We visited the staff kitchen on the 6th floor with its views across Hounslow, met the IT department and learned about the work that they do, visited the beautiful and wellequipped public library and also saw where some of the volunteer coaches work with their teams. This was followed by a 'speed networking' activity where pupils worked in pairs with members of staff who rotated around the group answering all of the pupils' questions. You could see the pupils gaining confidence and communicating

Just before lunch, the pupils took part in a workshop about ensuring Hounslow is a safe space to live in. The pupils used great communication skills explaining their opinions and gave excellent recommendations to support the council and their project on ensuring young people and other residents feel safe in the Borough. The pupils then had the opportunity to meet one of the Hounslow Councillors, Katherine Dunne and the Chief Executive of the Council, Niall Boulger. They spoke about their routes into their positions and the difference between the political side and the business sides of the leadership and decision making that occurs within the Council. The pupils asked them great questions.



Our final two activities involved more group discussion and team work. The pupils took part in a mini COP and discussed climate change and the ways in which Heathland and Hounslow Council could mitigate that -there were some brilliant ideas and it was great to hear about the work that the Environmental Group has been doing already at the Heathland School. Lastly, Hounslow gave the pupils spaghetti and marshmallows and the groups used their teamwork and resilience to build some very impressive structures!

On reflection at the end of the day, the pupils said that they had built their skills and learned about the World of Work in their local area. Overall the pupils did themselves and the school proud! They were very interested in the different roles and the experience seemed to inspire many of them to think about their future goals more seriously. Some of the Year 9 girls thanked the host at the end of the day and said that they would like to work at the council and that they would remember to focus on Maths and English to be able to apply for roles in the future.
