The Scholar's Programme Launch Event took place at St Anne's College, Oxford in partnership with University of Oxford.

The Brilliant Club works alongside schools and universities across the United Kingdom mobilising the PhD community of researchers and education experts to support students attending public schools and who are less advantaged to gain a place at the most elite universities for higher education.

14 of The Heathland School's Year 9 students had been nominated by Miss Suleman and selected to participate in the tutoring programme (Y9 Subject: More than just fiction? Language and Identity in Fantasy Novels). The Launch Event was an introductory overview of the programme, what is to be expected and a general briefing of work and social life balance at university.

Following a welcome game of 'Guess the University', we had a short session on the Scholar's Programme and The Hub (an online platform allowing messages to be exchanged between students and their tutors and where assignments are to be submitted) whereby we were informed of our pupil journey.

The wide assortment of sandwiches and juice certainly did not go unnoticed, but we were excited for the afternoon's activities to come no doubt!

A Q&A talk with current Oxford students enabled us to ask any and every question and gave us an idea of their university life and how to make the most of your time at higher education facilities managing your workload.

At the end of the day, we were invited to a tour of the university led by two student ambassadors of St Anne's in their first and second years.

To wrap up, we met again with the organiser for a study skills session on critical thinking strategies and then it was back to The Heathland School.

As of this moment, we have our final assignment to look forwards to in completing in March. The Scholar's Programme will prove to be an insightful and pleasurable journey with hopefully astonishing and gratifying outcomes!

To kick things off, we had a visit from author Manjeet Mann. Both of Manjeet's YA novels, *Run, Rebel* and *The Crossing*, were shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal and *The Crossing* won the Costa Book Award 2022.

She spoke in the Main Hall to our Year 9 cohort about the inspiration behind her verse novels; this included a fascinating look into her experience with the migrant crisis on England's south coast and her experience of growing up in an extremely deprived area. Pupils asked insightful questions about her writing process, about what it means to be a working author and about how she sees the migrant crisis being resolved.

We then had two visits from Lou Abercrombie, author of *Fig Swims the World* and *Coming Up for Air*. On the Friday

before World Book Week, Lou spoke to all of our Year 7s and 8s about her books

before working with small groups of Year 7 pupils in a workshop. These pupils thoroughly enjoyed the chance to be creative as they made mind-maps outlining their own characters. On the following Wednesday, Lou came back again and the Year 12s enjoyed hearing about her interesting career path and her journey to becoming a published author. Lou then delivered more workshops in the library, this time for year 8, whose character mind-maps were fantastic!

Finally, to finish off a fantastic fortnight, we read our whole school short story and held our staff costume day on February 3rd. Staff costumes ranged from Orwell's *Animal Farm* to characters from well-known fairy tales.

Higher Education Day

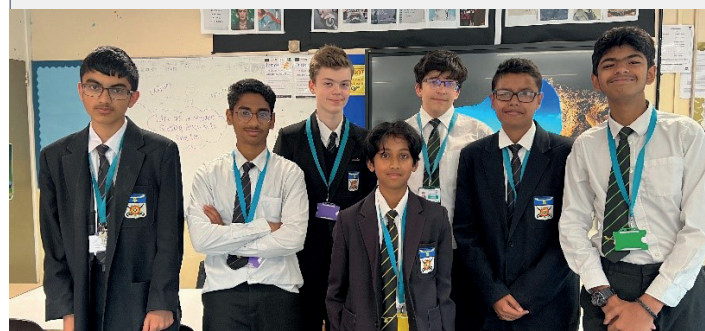

Post Mortem Live!



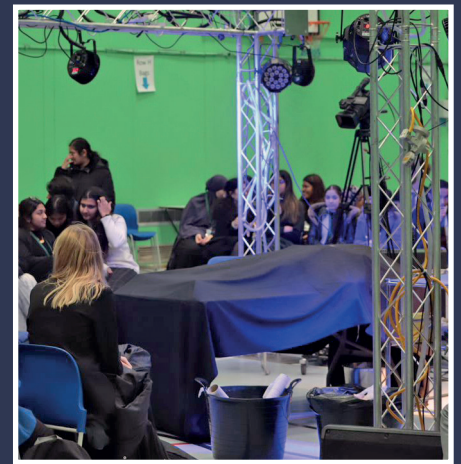
Experiencing the Post Mortem Live!

All the Sixth Form Biology and PE students were invited to a unique experience, a live dissection hosted at The Heathland School. It was an immersive experience that used special effects and stimulation in order to recreate a realistic post-mortem experience. We were able to deepen our understanding on the human anatomy, a live post-mortem was conducted by professionals on a convincing human model containing animal's organs.

We were then given the opportunity to carry out some hands on learning of

our own by dissecting and focusing on essential organs like the lungs. We were further educated on the details of post mortem procedures including determining the cause of death.

Many topics we had learnt in class, such as transport in animals and blood circulation, were integrated in the live dissection. This provided us with visual representation of biological processes in our own bodies, which aided a deeper understanding of the structure of our organs and how they function. It was an eye opening experience!

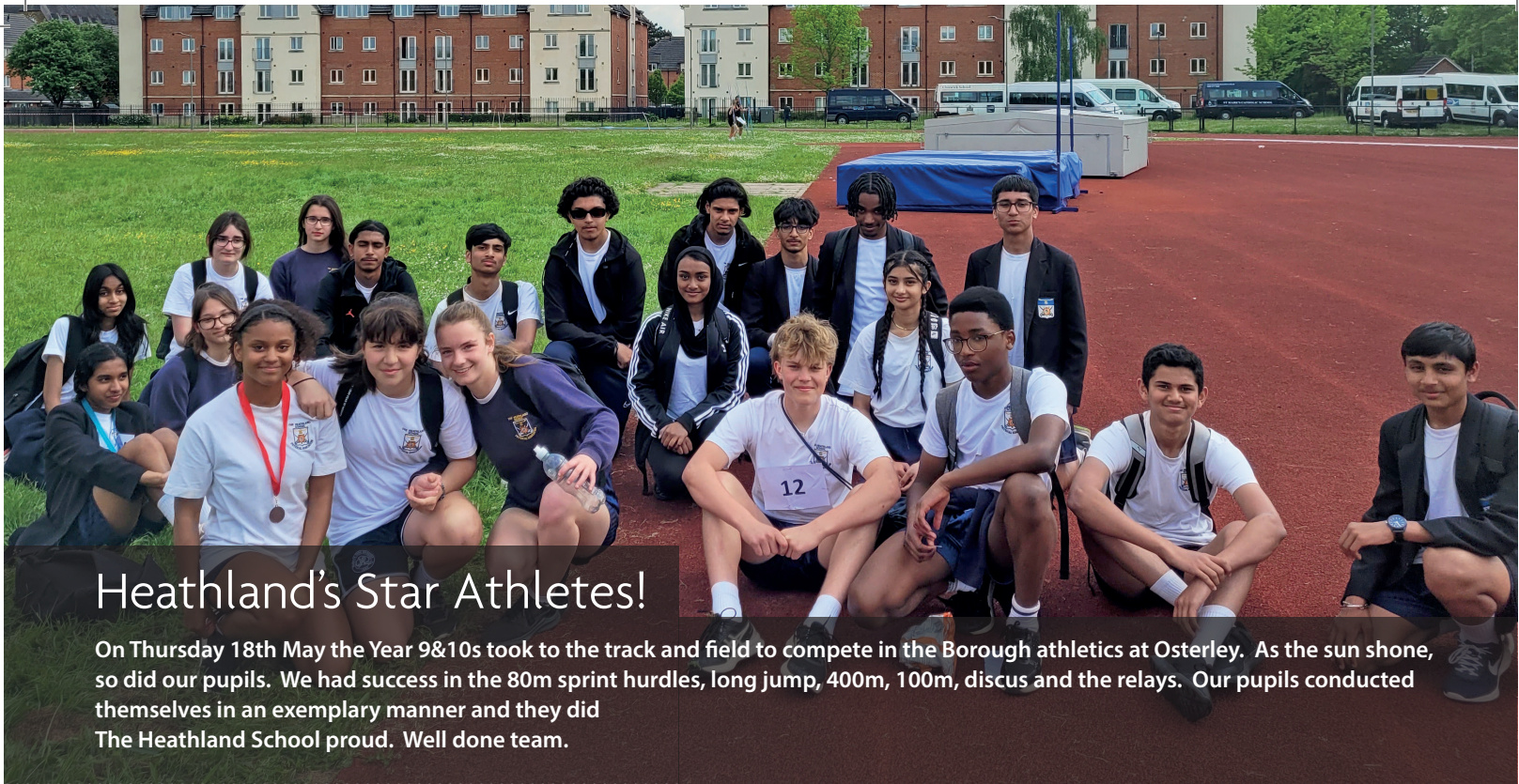
