

Key Stage 3 History

Introduction

The Key Stage 3 History Curriculum enables pupils to study the history of Britain and the wider world through a combination of breadth studies and in depth enquiries. Alongside their work in lessons, pupils are set half-termly homework projects that either extend their understanding of the work in lessons or enable them to investigate areas outside of the topics covered in class. The homework projects are one strand of the way in which pupils are assessed and encourage them to develop a range of skills, including essay writing and source analysis.
