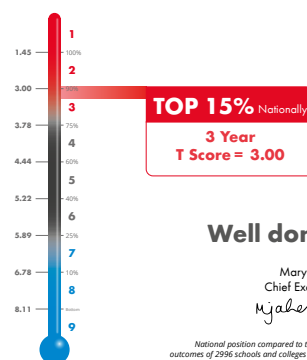

This summer's results yielded another success for The Heathland School, with recognition from the ALPS body's Chief Executive Mary Ahern for our Outstanding Progress.

The school achieved a position within the top 15% of 2996 schools and further education colleges across the UK.

ALPS is a system used by approximately 3000 schools and colleges across the country to get a measure of the progress made by A level students. It compares the A level grades achieved by students to what might have been previously expected of them following their GCSE results. In 2019, Sixth Form students at the Heathland had made such excellent progress that ALPS placed the school in the top 15% of schools/colleges in the country.

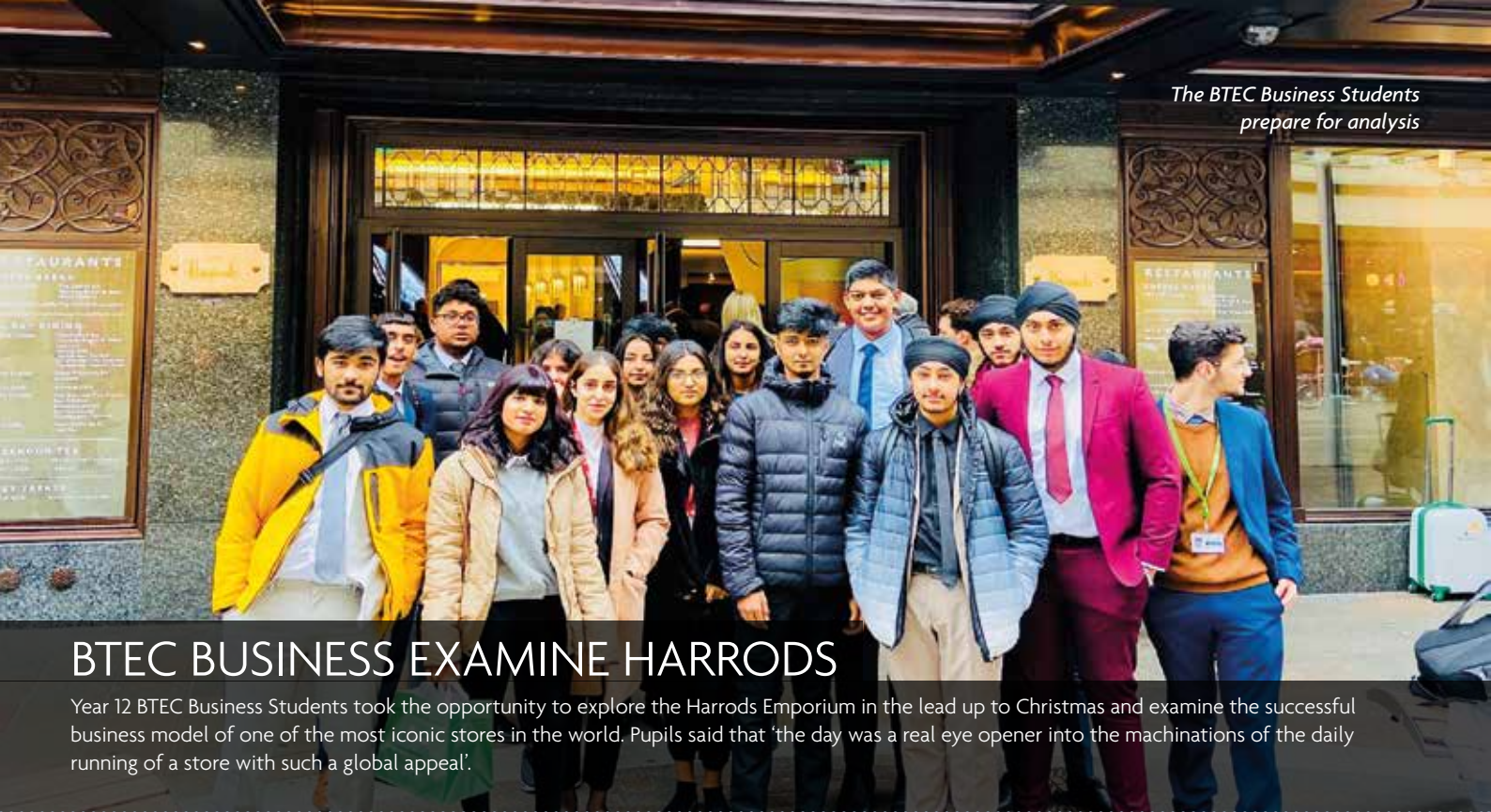
